Oxford Computing Competition


Well done to all the Bebras Gold awards students who have been busy coding this week as part of the Oxford University Computing Competition. Great effort and perseverance from all.

Charity Haircut



Congratulations to Year 9 student Ross Lennard for raising money for a fantastic charity. Please read the article (extracted below) to find out more information.

Charity hair is a family affair. Grandparents sport pink and violet in support of I 2-year-old Ross' fundraising cut for air ambulance. Do not adjust your screens... granddad really does have violet hair. When I 3-year-old Ross Lennard vowed to have his head shaved to raise money in honour of a family friend who lost both legs in an accident, his grandparents made a pledge too.

Grandma Serena Coventry said: "We told him that, if he managed to raise more than £2,000, I'd dye my hair red and granddad Bryan would die his pink!"

Local gamekeeper Andy Soper suffered life-changing injuries in the accident in New Year's Eve 2020. He became trapped between a silver Nissan Qashqai and another vehicle, sustaining injuries Hampshire police described at the time as potentially life-threatening. Mr Soper, aged 46, subsequently had to have both legs amputated below the knee. Ross' chosen charity is the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance, which airlifted Mr Soper to Southampton General Hospital, where his legs were amputated to save his life.

Friends rallied round and one fundraising page, created by George Brown from Leckhamstead, said "He has had great hospital care. Sadly, due to the injuries sustained, Andy woke up to find his left leg amputated below the knee. Unfortunately since the he has lost his right leg too due to the injuries. Andy is a fantastic character and taking it all exceptionally well. He is an ambassador for the countryside and very much and outdoors man... he was seen daily on local farms in his land Rover. It would be a wonderful thing if you might donate towards an adapted 4x4 for him to keep his independence and allow Andy to keep part of his old life going. He is a value to the countryside and local community."

Ross, whose family are friends with Mr Soper, set about growing his hair long – just so he could raise money by having it cut off. And at the weekend Mr Soper was there to perform the deed himself. Ross raised more than the \pounds 2,000 that his grandparents challenged him to do – and they were as good as their word.

Mrs Coventry, of Field Barn Farm, Kingsclere, said: "Ross always had short hair, so to volunteer to grow it so long was a big deal for him. We promised him we'd join him by dyeing our own hair if he passed the £2,00 mark. He did. And we did."


Performing Arts - War Horse
