


# Year 10 Exams

The Year 10 Examinations ran from Monday June 27th until Friday July 8th. These were the first formal examinations sat by this cohort and were run in a very similar fashion to the GCSE's which preceded them. As with the GCSE Exams, the students behaviour, focus and attendance were excellent throughout and our external invigilators were very impressed with the students. The outcomes of these examinations will be shared with students and parents before the end of term. Staff from a number of subject areas will be providing students with some additional coursework or exam preparation tasks to complete before their return in September, this is to ensure that students commence Year 11 in the strongest possible position to fulfil their potential in their GCSE's.

# Wellbeing Week

A busy week in and out of school for all students, which hopefully broadened their experiences and enabled them to participate in some activities they hadn't tried before. Year 10 focused on work experience and engaging in opportunities more closely related to work and post school. Opportunities were taken up across the local area and students embraced the placements they attended. Year 7-9 stayed in school and chose to do different activities across the week from yoga to doodling and STEM to mindfulness. The students were in mixed year groups and able to develop their social skills making the school even more inclusive. # School Production of 'Hijacked Fairytales'

On the 13th of July, The Clere School ran their first school production in over 5 years! Students from Years 7-10 performed Kevin Jannett's 'Hijacked Fairytales', a light-hearted comedy to lift spirits after the pandemic! Students were involved in directing scenes, designing and operating the lighting and sound and created costumes! As well as the production elements of the show, students took ownership of their acting roles, multi-rolling between the ensemble parts too! Our drama teacher, Miss Smith never once had to ask students to learn their lines! Miss Smith added "all students who were involved in the production were a joy to work with, demonstrating passion for the subject, resilience and commitment, attending multiple after school and lunchtime rehearsals! Over 80 people came to watch the 20 students involved on the evening, and students also did performances to Year 5 students from local primary schools. Our performing arts department has grown considerably over the last two years and we are excited for this to continue next year!

Certainly some of the KB storage options that were about a metre high definitely took some by surprise. However it was definitely the retro coding of snake in Basic that garnered the most enthusiasm.

Competitions followed with Bebras, Oxford University Computing Challenge, CyberFirst for Year 8 girls and more recently the Samsung Solve for Tomorrow: Next Gen. A huge well done to all participants.



All KS3 students were part of a Pathfinder survey for this. Their insights are greatly appreciated. Well done to all Cyber Ambassadors but a particular mention to Josh Gillate and Lydia Marks who have shown incredible resilience, resourcefulness and initiative throughout their time as a Cyber Ambassador.

In lessons it was great to see the Year 11s focussing in and really pushing themselves to get themselves in the best position possible for their exams. Not only has it been 2 years without any form of external judgement these students have faced the first exam of a brand new syllabus. For the summer term, KS3 the lessons have focussed on Technology in Society for Year 9, Computational thinking for Year 8 and Data representation for Year 7. Year 8 have been programming real life scenarios using traffic lights and INVENT robot cars. Year 7 have been learning how image data is represented on a computer. They have discovered the difference between bitmap and vector graphics and produced some very creative logos. It has been inspiring to see the work produced by many of the students.

# Art and Photography Update

In the Art Department we have had an industrious and exciting year creating lots of new pieces of artwork and photographs, learning a whole new range of skills and knowledge. Each year students work to a similar format throughout each project where they start with a topic title, research through critical studies different artists and movements and then developing their own ideas. Some of the skills they have learnt throughout this year are different drawing techniques, for example line and tone, colour blending and texture, the use of photomontage and collage and a whole range of different photography techniques. Some of the projects we have completed this year are climate crisis, students research the different issues we have with the climate and the reasons why. The students go on to produce a piece of work which represents this. We took part in Ink October, students draw a different image every day, using ink. We have looked at Pop Artist and how it influences modern artists of today. We have also studied different textures and colours while studying the form and shape of different insects, finally producing a symmetrical piece of artwork. assessment criteria at Key Stage 3. Please see some examples of our amazing students' Art and Photography work. Our Key Stage 4 students have managed to complete in-depth final projects which have a similar assessment criteria as Key Stage 3.



# Hampshire Book Awards

On Tuesday 28 June 2022, 9 Year 8s took part in the Hampshire Book Awards in which schools from across Hampshire get together and choose the best book for teenagers published in 2021. We could not attend the event at Costello School in person so we participated through Teams.



The students involved were Shaun Chaffe, Morgan Jackman, Molly Dallaway, Katy Dyer, Sofia Mills, Annabelle Grant-Jones, Harvey Matos, Isaac Hart and Lucy Blatchford.



Over the last 3 months, we each read the 6 books on the shortlist: 'Ground Zero' by Alan Gratz; 'Cardboard Cowboys' by Brian Conaghan; 'Giften' by Leyla Suzan; 'Black Brother, Black Brother' by Jewel Parker Rhodes and 'Tsunami Girl' by Julian Sedgwick and Chie Kutsuwada. At the event, we discussed our favourites and what we like about them and then voted for the book we thought was the best.

The Clere School voted for 'Ground Zero'. This book interweaves and connects the stories of 2 children aged 12: Brandon who is in the North Tower of the World Trade Centre in New York when it is hit by a plane on 11th September 2001, and Reshmina who lives in Afghanistan when, on 11th September 2020, she meets an American soldier injured during a conflict with the Taliban. Our students liked the realism of the two stories and the way the writers conveyed the feelings of the main characters.

Second favourite was 'Tsunami Girl' which is set in Japan before, during and after the tsunami of 2011. Yuki is visiting her Grandfather when the wave hits and they get separated. The story is told through writing and through Manga (Japanese comic strip pictures). We found it exciting and mysterious and admired Yuki's emotional and physical courage.

Interestingly, the result of the vote of all Hampshire schools was the same, so the Hampshire Book Award 2022 goes to 'Ground Zero'!

There are several copies of each of the 6 books in the library if anyone would like to read them.

Mrs Thomas says thank you to all the students who took part in reading the books and participating in the award day so enthusiastically. Thank you also to all members of staff who enabled this event to happen.

## Swimming Gala


