



Exam Results Day 2021-FAQs

How were my grades arrived at this year?

Grades this summer were based on Centre Assessed Grades (CAGs). CAGs were submitted to the exam boards by us as a holistic assessment of students' performance in a subject, following a rigorous process of assessment, moderation and quality assurance.

These grades were then approved by the relevant exam board, following external quality assurance checks.

In some cases, the CAGs we submitted may have been reviewed by the exam board, who may have asked us to submit an alternative grade. However, any changes to the grades we submitted were done by professional teachers or reviewers; this year no grades have been changed as a result of an algorithm.

What do I do if I'm not happy with my grade?

Results day is a very emotional occasion for students, particularly in the current circumstances. In the first instance, we would encourage you to come and talk to a member of the Senior Leadership Team on results day where we will be on hand to support you.

We strongly recommend that students take some time away from school, to reflect on their results.

If you have the grades you need for your post 16 course, you should be congratulated and look forward to your next steps. The cohort of 2021 will be widely understood as the group of students who had a very disrupted and different experience. Colleges, universities and employers will be aware of the challenges your year group have faced.

All students have the opportunity to appeal their grade if they meet the eligibility criteria (see below). It is important to note that an appeal may result in a grade being lowered, staying the same, or going up. Therefore, if a student puts in an appeal and their grade is lowered, they will receive the lower mark.

There is also the option to sit GCSE examinations in the autumn, which may be preferable to some students. Please see the information below on the autumn series 2021.

I don't think I have the results for my courses next year, what should I do?

If you have not got the grades you need for your chosen post 16 course, we suggest that you contact your chosen college directly on the telephone numbers in your results envelope. Post 16 providers are aware that circumstances this year are very different to normal and will be happy to advise you.

The National Careers Service has also set an exam results helpline again during August 2021. The helpline is open from 8am to 8pm Monday to Friday and 10am-5pm on Saturdays.

Autumn series/ resits

How do I resit in the autumn series?

Ofqual have decided that in the autumn series:

- exam boards will have to offer exams in all GCSE subjects
- exams will be in their normal format, with no adaptations made
- There will be no non-exam assessments (NEA) for GCSEs. Grades will be determined by a student's performance in an exam for all subjects, except for art and design qualifications
- GCSE exams will take place in November and December

The final exam board deadlines for entries are not yet confirmed but they are usually early September which is a short period of time to decide whether to enter these exams.

It is worth considering that you will have started your Post 16 courses and will be adjusting to the demands of new courses which will have a significant workload. Being able to fully prepare for the autumn series without teachers, classes and revision lessons will require a lot of dedication.

As is normal practice, students who have not reached grade 4 in English Language or Maths will retake these subjects at college. If however you wish to be entered for a re-sit you can email examenquiries@clere.hants.sch.uk
