Battlefields Trip 2019

On 27th September, at the unearthly hour of 4am, 54 GCSE History students from Years 10 and 11 set off from The Clere for a trip to the continent. We were met by two World War One soldier guides who would spend the next three days taking us through the cemeteries and battlefields of the Ypres Salient.



We started day two by visiting the cemetery where another student, Charlie's Great-great-great Uncle, was buried and saw where he fought and won a medal for bravery. It was certainly an emotional start to the day! We looked at the medical aspects of the war, getting to visit Advanced Dressing Stations and the opportunity to see how stretcher bearers would evacuate the wounded from the battlefield. We visited Langemark German Cemetery and compared it to that of Tyne Cot Cemetery, the largest Commonwealth cemetery in the world. We were able to take in the vastness of the sacrifice that was made by so many, on both sides, during the war.



Having "looked for fish" out of the window on the Eurostar, we visited the first site of the day where we got to walk along the frontlines of 1914-1917. We braved the icy wind and rain to see some of the craters caused by tunnels built under enemy lines. After lunch, we got the chance to walk through a recreated trench where we were 'gassed' and some of us got the chance to fire a WWI rifle. We then got to visit where one of our students, Emma's Great-great-great Uncle, had fought and died in Hooge. Finally we visited a trench system at Hill 60, where we were able to explore the site and see the distance between the British and German lines. We then headed for the youth hostel and dinner, before heading off to bed.









After some free time and dinner, we headed to the Menin Gate to take part in the Last Post Ceremony, and had the opportunity to lay a wreath to remember the family members of those on our trip. It was a truly moving moment as everyone fell silent and to reflect on all that we had seen and heard about over the last two days.

Our final day saw us visit a range of different sites further away from the frontline, in particular the location of a Field Ambulance Headquarters. We were also given a talk by our guides on the different medical equipment which was used, as well as getting a chance to try on some of the uniform. We then headed to Poperinge where we saw the death cells and the execution pole where men would be 'shot at dawn' for cowardice. We finished our trip with a visit to Talbot House, a rest and recreation place for British soldiers. Here we were able to see some of the kinds of entertainment that soldiers would have had there, before finally having a cup of tea and listened to some of the group play the piano. A relaxing way to finish the trip before heading back home!

Basing House Trip

On the 21st November, Year 9 headed off to Basing House to discover how it was involved in the English Civil War. Students got the opportunity to look at what soldiers would have carried in their 'snapsacks', including replica food, bowls, cups and equipment. They had to work out what each item would have been used for and why they may have carried it.







Having looked at some of the replicas, students then got the chance to look at artefacts from the Civil War. They had the opportunity to look at pieces of pottery and work out what they might have been 400 years before.

They had the chance to stand in the shoes of those who fought in the war and heard about what happened at the siege of Basing House. They also had to think about why the different sides acted as they did, looking at the consequences of the actions that were made and how different people would have felt.

The last activity before lunch was the chance to hear about the owner of Basing House, John Paulet, and what happened to him, finishing off by trying on some of the armour that those fighting would have worn.







In the afternoon, we headed to the site of Basing House and got the opportunity to use GPS to discover more about the different features of the old site. Discovering the deep wells and the defences that were put in place to allow the house to withstand the Parliamentarian attack.

It was then back on to the coach to warm up as we headed back to school.

Having learned about this topic in Year 9 and about to start investigating the role of the Nazis in Germany as part of their GCSE studies, this group were able to make links between the historical theory of the past and the experiences of someone who was an eyewitness to the terrible events.

The students who took part in listening to Eva Schloss agreed that it was a rare opportunity to hear a voice from the past who could deliver a warning for the present about the importance of tolerance in our communities. 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


UKMT Mathematical Circle

GCSE Computer Science Students Visit BAE Systems

On Friday 11th October 2019, 10 GCSE Computer Science students had the opportunity to visit BAE Systems for an exclusive STEM event for girls. BAE Systems is the UK's largest defence and security company, they employ over 34,800 people and work with more than 7,500 British companies. They commit themselves to create the best equipment and services for armed forces and government. The event was held to introduce new career ideas and prospects to teenage girls, and to hopefully convince them into a career in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths).





The day began by going around the room and talking to several different people, mainly engineers, about the different jobs they did. They showed lots of different tech that they use to help with their day-to-day jobs and gave a brief description of how important their jobs were. More was learned about this in the group discussions with all of the invited specialists in the room. One very interesting person spoke about her work for the Government to protect all of our information. Her job is to break down any defences the Government use around our data and information, then she advises them on how to improve their cyber-security.

The best part of the day was the final two hours, as the task was to create a website about Internet safety. It was really interesting, and trying to write in HTML was very challenging. Each website had to be presented to the rest of the groups with the best group winning Amazon echo dots. Ella Murrey, Phoebe Goodyear and Cody Learwood were voted as the best website and presentation.

The day was very interesting with this event showcasing the different careers that are available for women in this field.

The Clere School selected as part of the Pilot Gender Balance in Computing Programme

At The Clere we are pleased to say that we are bucking the national trend for girls choosing to study Computer Science GCSE. Nationally there is a 20% uptake. For the last three years at The Clere the uptake has been significantly higher. However there is still work to be done and we are pleased to have been selected as one of the 70 pilot schools for the Gender Balance programme.

The Raspberry Pi Foundation is working with the National Centre for Computing Education on a project funded by the Department for Education.

Together, they are exploring ways of engaging more female students in computing in order to increase the number of girls who select Computer Science at GCSE and A level. The project aim is to make clearer links between learning computing in informal activities and formal computing education. It is giving an amazing opportunity to investigate different approaches to engage girls in computing and to help increase the number of girls who select Computer Science at GCSE and A level.

Office 2016 Free for All

As part of the upgrade to Windows 10 and Office 2016, all students have free access to download Office 2016 on 5 different devices. The installation can be accessed via the student's school email account, followed by clicking on 'my account'.


