I became a teacher because I wanted to make a difference to the students and saw no better way than promoting a confident and accurate command of the languages they use. Being able to communicate effectively is the key to future success. I became the Faculty Lead for Communications in September 2018 after joining the school in January as part of the English team. I was previously a Head of English for nine years and an Assistant Headteacher for nearly four years, so bring that experience to this role at The Clere.

The Faculty Lead for Communications role is a diverse position that feels very much at the heart of the changes that the school is making. It means that alongside teaching English and Drama, I line manage the English department by working with the English team to prepare students with the skills needed in Key Stage 3 and to guide and support students through their ever increasingly important English Language and Literature GCSEs. Additionally, I manage the Modern Foreign Languages department, and at a time where the international and economic landscape is changing, the benefits of communicating with others, not just in English, but in other widely spoken languages has never been more imperative.

My wider roles in the school include Whole School Literacy and Primary Liaison, which involves organising the school's Open Evening, Open mornings, the Learn Together Event and the Year 5 Experience days in June.

Furthermore, I have always lived locally to The Clere; I grew up in Woolton Hill, my children attend a local school and playgroup and I am still very much involved in communities around the local villages that The Clere supports. I know the area well and this was a key motivator as to why I wanted to join the superb staff at the school.

On the 6th of March 2019, Year 10 Photography students were given the opportunity to visit the newly built The Base at Greenham Business Park. At The Base there was an exhibition by Wildlife Photographer of the Year which showcased a mixture of amateur and professional photographers' work. There was even work from children under 10 and ages 11-15.





After we walked around the exhibition, we got on the mini bus and headed to Greenham Control Tower. A kind volunteer who works there opened the tower just for The Clere School, so that we could see the exhibition before it closed. He gave us a tour around the control tower and talked to us about the history of the building.

On the second floor of the tower, there was an exhibit called 'Common People' by Wendy Carring. This gave us an opportunity to learn about the peace protestors at Greenham Common in the 1980s. After looking around the exhibit the students walked across Greenham Common and took photos for their fragments project. Overall, we all enjoyed the trip and left having learnt more about the history of the area and photographs.









Year 9 'Get Inspired'

On Tuesday 29th January 2019, 40 Year 9 pupils attended the Get Inspired! careers event in Basingstoke, organised by the Education Business Partnership. The event gathered together over 50 local employers, apprenticeship and further education providers, recruiters and trainers. The breadth of providers was extensive, from local colleges to engineering champions, football academies to multi-national manufacturers.

Throughout the morning pupils were invited to put their skills to the test in challenges of speed, skill and engineering to build the tallest tower from just straws and sticky tape, plan a flood resistant landscape and fold some very fancy napkins! It was a credit to Year 9 to see their engagement, hear the excellent questions they had for the exhibitors and find out more about the range of careers to which they aspire. This was the first time an event of this kind had been offered in this area of Hampshire and we are so pleased that our pupils were among those to benefit from this quality insight into their options for the future.

After meeting the District Judge who would be overseeing the trial, pupils were then taken to the public gallery to watch the start of the trial, with the prosecution witnesses giving their evidence and being cross-examined. Pupils were also able to watch the "Body Worn" camera footage from the arresting Police Officer who attended the scene of the crime.

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Computer Science Trip to Arqiva

As part of their Computer Science GCSE students were given a rare opportunity to visit Arqiva, a leading UK communications infrastructure company. Their infrastructure and associated services enable millions of people and machines to connect wherever they are through TV, radio, mobile and the Internet of Things (IoT).

The visit gave the students the fantastic opportunity to work with the software developers who wrote code for the 'red button' that we are so used to accessing on our smart TVs. Students were taken through the development process of the very latest interactive TV guide developed for iOS, which had only been launched a few weeks earlier. They were also given a very important lesson on cyber security and were involved in activities that showed how easy it is to access personal data if you are not fully aware.

As part of the site tour, the students were privileged to go into the Master Control Room (MCR) - without doubt everyone's favourite. The MCR is an area which monitors internet and hybrid TV across the world with over 400 TV screens.

The students were quite keen to know how you could get a job which involved 'watching TV' all day. Career discussion was also a major part of the visit, with students being shown the many routes that can be taken into technology.
